REVIEW OF PAST YEAR IN FAYETTE

Brief Resume of Some of the Past Year - Looking Back at Accomplishments in the Old Town on the Volga

It is always interesting at the beginning of a new year to consider what has transpired in the year just ended. The past year has been one of the most interesting in our history.

There have been many minor betterments and some major ones, which have indicated a real tendency toward stable morale and determination to keep moving ahead.

Here are listed some of the evidences of progress, which may well be of interest to the community.

The former Sugar Bowl building which has been unused except for some storage, was bought by R. W. McLessee from the Bray & Abel owners, and was entirely redecorated, re-floored with cement, and as soon as ready for occupancy was fitted with a stock of furniture by Mr. McLessee and the Loyte interests at Independence. For some time Fayette had been without a furniture store.

Another new enterprise is Walker's Flower and Gift Shop, conducted by Miss Lorraine Walker and her mother, Mrs. W. H. Walker. The building next to the post office was purchased and thoroughly renovated and re-decorated, and presents an attractive business appearance on the street.
