Alexander and Robertson Families. Stories Wanted

It is a surprising fact that no Fayette County History contains any copies of speeches, letters, or writings by Robert Alexander, or of his two sons-in-law, Samuel H. Robertson and James E. Robertson.

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Martha Alexander died in 1863. This fixes a very early date for the events described in this letter.

LOANS AVAILABLE ON SOY BEANS OF LOWER GRADE

Under the regional soybean loan program Commodity loans were available only on beans grading No. 3 or better with moisture content not in excess of 14%.

The loan rate is as follows: \$1.55 for beans grading No. 4 with 6% damage; \$1.53 for beans grading No. 4 with 7% damage; \$1.51 for beans grading No. 4 with 8% damage.

The loan value for beans grading sample shall be \$1.51 less one-half cent per bushel for each 1 per cent damage in excess of 8%.

It appears that the storage situation is becoming more acute each day. Processing plants in Iowa are now practically filled to capacity.
