Abree Ruth Hilton was born the oldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Hilton, on October 9, 1900, near Fort Pierre, and died at Onedia, South Dak., April 20, 1936 at the age of twenty-six years, six months and eleven days.

Blessed with three sons, Sheldon Keith, four years old; Richard Dale, one and one half years old and a baby boy only a day old who preceded his mother in death but four days. Besides her sorrowing husband and two children, the deceased is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Hilton, as well as her brother Clifford of Gettysburg, her sisters, Mrs. Alvin Rau of Harrold; Mrs. Evelyn Bassett of Gettysburg, Orval at home, a brother James who is a student at State College. Mrs. Bright had taken ill with pneumonia on Wednesday and brought to the Onedia hospital at once Friday, April 17. Baby boy was prematurely born, named William, but lived only until Saturday. The young mother struggled valiantly against overwhelming odds but weakened as she was, the light for life proved too much for her, Monday afternoon, April 20, 1936 at four o'clock she passed on.

Obituary of Walter E. Warnke. Walter E. Warnke, only son of John and Augusta Warnke, was born, Dec. 16, 1912 near Randalia, Iowa, the same year on Dec. 21st he was baptized into the name of the True God. His father died March 27, 1917 leaving Walter fatherless at the age of four years. He went to school in Randalia until moving to West Union in 1926, where he then completed his schooling. Since that time he has been employed in farming. He was confirmed in the Lutheran church at Maynard, Iowa August 23, 1923 and remained a member of that denomination until his death.

Walter was always cheerful and blessed with a strong healthy body until four years ago when he was stricken with a complication of diseases from which he did not recover until a year later. All that loving hands and medical science could do was given him, but to no avail. He departed this life at the hospital in Postville, Iowa, April 25th, 1936 about 6:10 A. M.

He leaves to mourn his brief sojourn on earth, two sisters, Mrs. Louise Meyer of Sumner, Iowa, and Mrs. Ella Cue of Randalia, his step father Ezra Rowland, one step brother Oliver Rowland, and three step sisters Mrs. Elvina Johnson of Clermont, Mrs. Yvonne Litter of Legonsport, Ind. and Mildred Rowland, also his fiancée, Miss Ethel M. Gordon of Postville, who with his other loved ones was at his bedside when his soul departed this life. He reached the age of 23 years 4 months and nine days. May he rest in peace.
