WEED OUT THE UNFIT MOTORIST

Kraschel Says He Will Require Every motorist To Take A Written Examination

Des Moines, Nov. 18—(Iowa Daily Press Bureau)—Governor-elect Nelson G. Kraschel today said he would recommend to the legislature a measure to "weed out the unfit motorist" by requiring every Iowa car driver to pass a written examination and a road test to get his drivers license.

Nearly 900,000 of Iowa's 1,000,000 motorists are operating cars under renewals of old drivers licenses obtained without undergoing the written and driving tests, according to state motor vehicle department records.

Under the present law new applicants and others who allowed licenses to lapse now must take examinations to obtain permits. The state motor vehicle division examined 116,541 such applicants up to Oct. 1 of this year and re-issued licenses to 28,254, or 21 per cent.

Kraschel pointed to the distinctly better safety records of the successful applicants as justification for a mandatory drivers license law. In a state motor vehicle study of 1,656 accidents involving 2,580 drivers, the examined motorist was three times safer a driver than his unexamined colleague the study showed.

"Getting the dangerous driver before his failings result in a serious accident seems to be part of the solution in accident prevention," Kraschel said. "Those who failed to pass the test were found to have faulty eyesight and other physical disabilities, lacked knowledge of the Iowa road laws, were unable to operate a car satisfactorily, or appeared for the test in cars which were not roadworthy."

LIBRARY BUILDING FOR IOWA U.

Iowa City, Ia., Nov. 18—(UP)—Erection of the first unit of the new \$1,600,000 library building will top the University of Iowa's building program for the next two years, President Eugene Gilmore announced today. He said the university is asking the legislature to include \$200,000 in the school's building budget for the next biennium to provide for the "much needed building."

Gilmore pointed out that the half million books owned by the University are scattered all over the campus and that many valuable books are unprotected from fire or water.

A 15 per cent grant is still being sought from the PWA for improvement of the west side athletic field. A similar grant has been made for a \$60,000 botanical laboratory building which will be started next spring.

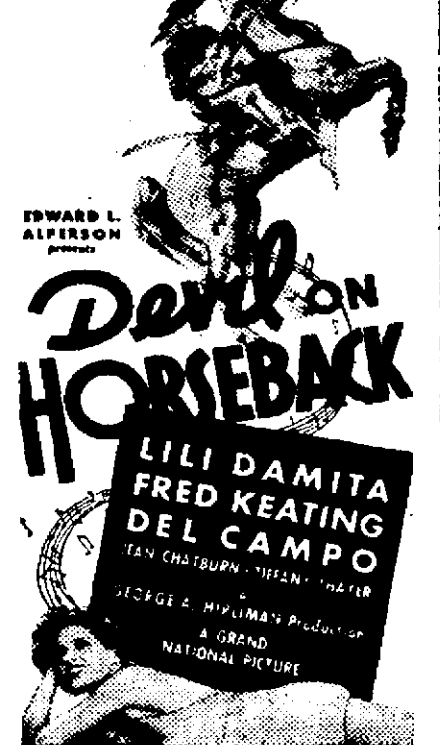
