The new list included two names not originally scheduled for the delegate-at-large position. They were E. G. Dunn of Mason City and Ed McManus of Keokuk who replaced the slated Judge D. E. Maguire of Dubuque and Ed H. Birmingham of Sioux City. Other delegates-at-large are Gen. Matt A. Tinley of Council Bluffs; Frank O'Connor, Dubuque; William J. Keefe, Clinton; Mrs. W. L. Eley, Sigourney; Mrs. June Fickel, Hastings, and Tom Walsh Davenport.

Seldom has a political convention in Iowa seen more exciting moments than those that ensued when J. C. Campbell of Charles City protested the principle of naming a slate of delegates-at-large. There was shouting and confusion; parliamentary tangles followed each other in rapid succession. Thirteen tentative delegates-at-large were nominated before eight finally were agreed upon to yield one-half vote each in the national convention.

There was more dissension over the comparatively minor matter of selecting the eight delegates than there was in adopting the wet platform plank and other such outstanding resolutions as those arguing repeal of the farm marketing act and abolition of the fur-browlaw and condemning the Smoot-Hawley tariff bill.

New Machine May Change Printing

Charlotte, N. C., March 29.—(UP)—Demonstration of the semigraph, an automatic typesetter invented by Buford L. Green, North Carolina printer, brought commendation from publishers and printing experts today as the most important contribution to printing since introduction of the Linotype. The machine, exhibited here yesterday, employs a photo-electric cell to operate the Linotype or Intertype machines automatically from copy. The cell is actuated by a light shining upon characters of a printed code which appears directly beneath letters in copy being set.

Copy is prepared on an especially designed typewriter. The typewriter prints each letter and the punched code character beneath it. The semigraph machine's photo-electric cell or "electric eye" automatically operates the Linotype as the code character reflects its light characteristic toward the photo-electric cell.

"It is the most marvelous invention I have ever seen," Col. Guy T. Visikiniski, former general manager of the Star company, declared, "I have been greatly impressed by its performance."

A. L. Stocking News said: "It is the most marvelous machine I have ever seen. One of the beauties of the whole thing is that it completely eliminates the keyboard and all of the cams on the Linotype machine."

Green, the inventor of the machine, is 40 years old and a native of Shelby, N. C. He has been working on the device the past six years with the financial assistance of Curtis L. Johnson, publisher of the Charlotte Observer.
