He is also survived by a brother Eugene Hanchett of Randalia. He was preceded in death by his father, mother, two sisters and a brother. The aged mother having preceded him by only eleven months.

Mr. Hanchett was a loving husband, father, brother and neighbor and he will be missed by a great number of friends. In spite of a great suffering he was conscious until within a few hours of death, and bade his family good-bye. He put up a hard brave fight to live, but was not able to survive the crises, and passed on to his Maker shortly after six o'clock, Saturday morning. Monona, Ia., Dec. 10.—(UP)—A situation making it "absolutely necessary for early and drastic action to reduce taxes upon real property" exists in Iowa; Louis H. Cook, member of the state board of assessment and review, asserted here last night at the farmers institute.

"It is not possible to continue indefinitely a taxation policy under which it takes up the average of at least 20 per cent of the gross income which can be earned upon farm, residence or ordinary classes of business property to pay the taxes. . . . Such taxation is approaching confiscation and has a direct bearing both upon the present downward trend of valuations and the difficulty in obtaining loans upon real estate," Cook declared.

Cook predicted "the adoption of the sales tax principle in a greatly extended form." His own preference, he said, is "the principles of a net income tax applied generally both through individuals and businesses and through the assessment of real property on the basis of its earning power." He said, however, "it will have no quarrel with those who sincerely advocate a general sales tax, for in any event such a tax will be

(Continued From Page 1.) have built up to take our case to the supreme court and obtain a reversal.

"Powers did not do this thing," he continued. "His story is true, however fantastic it seems, and we had only one thing to do and that was to put the truth as our defense."

With both state and defense resting after three days of testimony, only two or three witnesses remained to be examined on the state's rebuttal today, Prosecutor Will E. Morris said last night.

Arguments will not take more than four hours, Morris said he would use little time in summing up for the state.

"Our case is so clear we won't need much argument," he said. "My first motion after the verdict," said Attorney Law, "will be to appeal to the supreme court. I have shown, in arguments on appeal for a change of venue that Powers is condemned already in Clarksburg. All that testimony will be joined with the testimony in the present trial as the basis of an appeal."
