

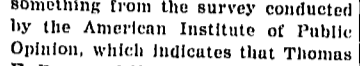

COMMENT

Those who like to build probabilities out of indications may construct something from the survey conducted by the American Institute of Public Opinion, which indicates that Thomas E. Dewey of New York is the present G. O. P. choice for the Republican presidential nomination.

On the other side of the political fence dividing the fervent Republicans from the fervid Democrats, the talk is that the Demos may run Hull and Farley around the track in 1940.

The theory advanced is that Hull is familiar with the international situation and there will be need for a president who answers that description.

Two years from now the international situation may not be what it is now. But that doesn't matter. If the Demos want Hull and Farley to head the ticket it is perhaps just as well to begin the "build-up" early.

Time alone will tell whether either Hull or Dewey will be president. The most heartening feature of the situation is that there actually is talk of a "next president" in both parties.

Not so long ago there were grave fears expressed that there never would be another president of the United States, but aroused voters have proved that there is plenty of Americanism left yet in this country and that dictatorship is not likely here—at least for some time to come.

The president's own attitude is somewhat reassuring, as shown by his interest in the Pan-American conference soon to be held in Lima, Peru, where the chief consideration is to be a strengthening of the spirit of resistance to foreign governmental poison.

Cordell Hull, Secretary of State, who is probably the outstanding representative among the twelve who are attending the conference, is, by the way, about the only one of Roosevelt's original "right hand men" who has maintained a desirable standard.

The dailies announce that Karl Frederick Gelsner, professor at Oberlin University, Ohio, was one of three Americans upon whom Adolf Hitler recently conferred the Order of Merit of the German Eagle, first class.

Local interest attaches to the announcement because Dr. Gelsner was graduated from U. I. U. in 1893 and was superintendent of the Fayette schools from 1893 to 1897. He has been prominent in educational circles ever since, and has made trips to Europe and a study of municipal conditions in Germany.

Local people are wondering what service he has given which would draw the favor of the German dictator. As it is stated that "the reasons for conferring the orders are never announced," it is not possible to say how he pleased the Fuehrer, but it is possible to say that anything which seems desirable to the German autocrat would run counter to the sentiment here.

However, to give Dr. Gelsner the benefit of the doubt it is perhaps well to quote Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, Stanford University president who is reported to have said, in regard to Hitler's awards that they may be "an attempt by Hitler to look for friends." He added, though: "I'm glad he didn't spot me." Two Stanford University professors were in the list given the Order by Hitler.

One of the men who received the award, a chamber of commerce official at San Francisco, said that he understood that it was for his efforts on behalf of foreign trade, saying he made a trip to Germany last year on that project. Another, a political science professor at Wittenberg college, Springfield, Ohio, has been at various times an exchange professor lecturing in German universities.
