Obituary. Leona Wright was born June 29, 1888, the third daughter of Caroline Rux and Andrew Wright, near Wesley, Kosuth County, Iowa. When she was seven years of age her father passed away and the family moved into the town of Wesley, where she attended and graduated from the Wesley high school, the following summer attended Teaching Institute. She taught for a time but her mother's health became poor so she went home to live and clerk in the store. After the death of her mother she kept the home for her step-father, L. J. Haynes, and half-brother, Elwood Haynes.

In June 1912 she was united in marriage to Lester Arthur Westgate. To this union were born three children, Frances La Von Mavis Claire, and Max who died at birth. After residing in the vicinity of Westgate and Wauaubun, Minn., the family settled on a farm one mile north of Randalia where they remained for thirteen years, then moving to another farm near Fayette where they have been for the past two years. Mrs. Arthur was stricken with her last illness six months ago. It was her lot to suffer severe pain constantly until the end came at 1:00 a. m. July 7 at the age of forty-eight years and eight days. Mrs. Arthur was especially talented in sewing craft and presenting the Bible to the children. She was baptized and joined the Methodist church when fifteen years of age being a faithful and willing worker all her life.

Besides her father and mother, one sister Cora Wright preceded her in death. She leaves to reverent memory, her husband Lester Arthur, two daughters Mavis at home and Max, Charville Bunting, home and Mrs. Oryella Bunting, one granddaughter, Judith Leaton, two sisters Mrs. H.
