Free Gets \$400 In State Money (Continued from Page One) with the Woodbury county district court, asking the court to reconvene the May grand jury to consider evidence he said he had collected on an alleged "liquor protection ring" in the county. The written request, which is being resisted by Woodbury County Attorney Maurice Rawlings, has been filed with District Judges F. H. Rice and A. O. Wakefield. Payments of undercover expense were not made public until early in June when a receipt bearing the name of "Fred Herman" was found to pertain to Fred Herman Free. At that time O'Connor said secrecy concerning the payments had been maintained so that Free's efficiency as an investigator would not be destroyed by publicity. Entering the transactions in the records might have tipped off the entire arrangement, the attorney general said. —Orders for all kinds of engraving taken at the Oelwein Daily Register Office.
