After their marriage they bought a farm south of Maynard where they lived until Jan. 15, 1907, when they died. The family then moved to Oelwein where ten years of his life was spent, then he moved to Gary, Ind., and later to Chicago where he lived the remainder of his life. He passed away at a hospital there Aug. 25, at the age of 70 years, 9 months and 22 days. During his youth he became a member of the Lutheran church and with his family was a regular attendant in Maynard while he lived near there. During the last years he was in poor health and death came as a welcome relief. Funeral services were held at 10 a. m., Aug. 28, at Hintz funeral home, conducted by Rev. A. Hufferman of Maynard.
