Obituary of Former Maynard Resident. Many of our older residents will recall the Lewis Hunt family. Mrs. John Stoddard of Oelwein, a daughter, passed away at Mercy hospital on Dec. 29th. As Jessie Mabel Hunt she was born January 25, 1884. Her early girlhood was spent on a farm near Maynard. In 1903 she was married to John Stoddard. The new home was established at Sumner, Ia. A son and two daughters came to bless this union, all of whom reside in Oelwein. They are Raymond Stoddard, Mrs. Lloyd Payne and Mrs. Lloyd King.

Mrs. Stoddard was taken suddenly ill on Dec. 22 and all that loving hands and medical skill could do was done but to no avail and on Sunday, Dec. 29th the Angel of Death quietly bore her to the realms of her eternal home. She was a quiet home-loving person and interested in her home and family with her husband and two sisters, one brother and four grandchildren are left to mourn her passing.
