Creamery Meeting.

Four new members were named to the board of directors of the Randalia Farmers Mutual Creamery company at the annual meeting here Tuesday, Jan. 10th. Warren Miner, Hugh Mabon, Irvin Sorge and Lee Jellings are the new ones. They succeed Ben Turner who was president in 1938.

The creamery bought 152,429 pounds of butterfat at an average price of 29.55 cents, and made 187,546 pounds of butter, sold at an average price of 27.13 cents. Patrons received a total of \$45,048 and sale of all dairy products brought \$51,772.64.
