NEWS IN THE WORLD OF
RELIGION

The Department of Overseas Mis-
sions of the Methodist Church of Aus-
tralia, with headquarters at Syd-
ney, Australia, has set aside three
missionaries to renew Christian work
among the natives of New Guinea
"as soon as the way is open". Already
a number of missionaries of the
church have returned for service in
the Fiji Islands. In addition, it has
evangelists, teachers, doctors, nurses,
agriculturists, and catechists
serving in Tonga, Samoa, Papua, In-
dia, and among the Aborigines in
northern Australia.

"Any discrimination against an in-
dividual based solely on race, color,
or national origin is un-American
and un-Christian," says Dr. Chau-
ning H. Tobias, senior secretary, Na-
tional Council of the Y. M. C. A. "If
a man is discriminated against be-
cause of ignorance, he can study, ac-
quire knowledge and overcome the
handicaps; if he is discriminated
against because of poverty, he can
work, acquire wealth and overcome
the handicap; if he is discriminated
against because he is unclean, he can
wash, acquire habits of cleanliness
and overcome the handicap; but if
the discrimination is based on color,
he cannot change that. The respon-
sibility for his being non-white is
not his but God's. Therefore, it is not
just an injustice to the man to ex-
clude him from fellowship on account
of color; it is an affront to the God
who made him as he is."

COUNTY KITCHENS BECOME
TIN MINES FOR WAR ITEMS

Women of Fayette county can
"mine" tin sufficient for 84 torpedoes
this year.
These figures were compiled by J.
A. Stewart, vice-president of the
American Can Company, on the basis
of canned foods consumed by civi-
lians in the county during 1943. On
the basis of last year's consumption,
civilians will open 2,361,228 cans of
food this year, he said. According to
a table recently issued by Washing-
ton, 28,000 cans provide tin suffi-
cient for one torpedo.
Meanwhile, the armed forces con-
sumed approximately three billion
cans of food during 1943 and needs
for the current year are expected to
rise to three and a quarter billion
cans, Mr. Stewart said. He pointed
out that with a greatly increased
number of the armed forces in over-
seas duty, more canned foods will
be needed because the can has pro-
ved the most practical container for
the shipment of foods abroad.
