FREDERIKA — Clarence Emil Alvin Hanson, son of Lars and Mathilda (Hanson) Hanson, was born May 10, 1899, at Waukon.

On June 1, 1927, he was united in marriage with Hazel Lippie. They farmed in Center Township, Allamakee County, Iowa. He was later employed for ten years by the Allis Chalmers Company in Cedar Rapids, retiring four years ago when he came to make his home in Frederika.

On April 11, he suffered a stroke and was hospitalized at Allen Memorial Hospital in Waterloo and was later transferred to the Allen Convalescent Home, where he died on Saturday afternoon.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Mildred Melghan of Frederika and Mrs. Honore (Wilma) Ewan, one son of Harpers Ferry, one brother, Elmer of Waukon, and seven grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his parents, his wife, and one daughter who died in infancy.

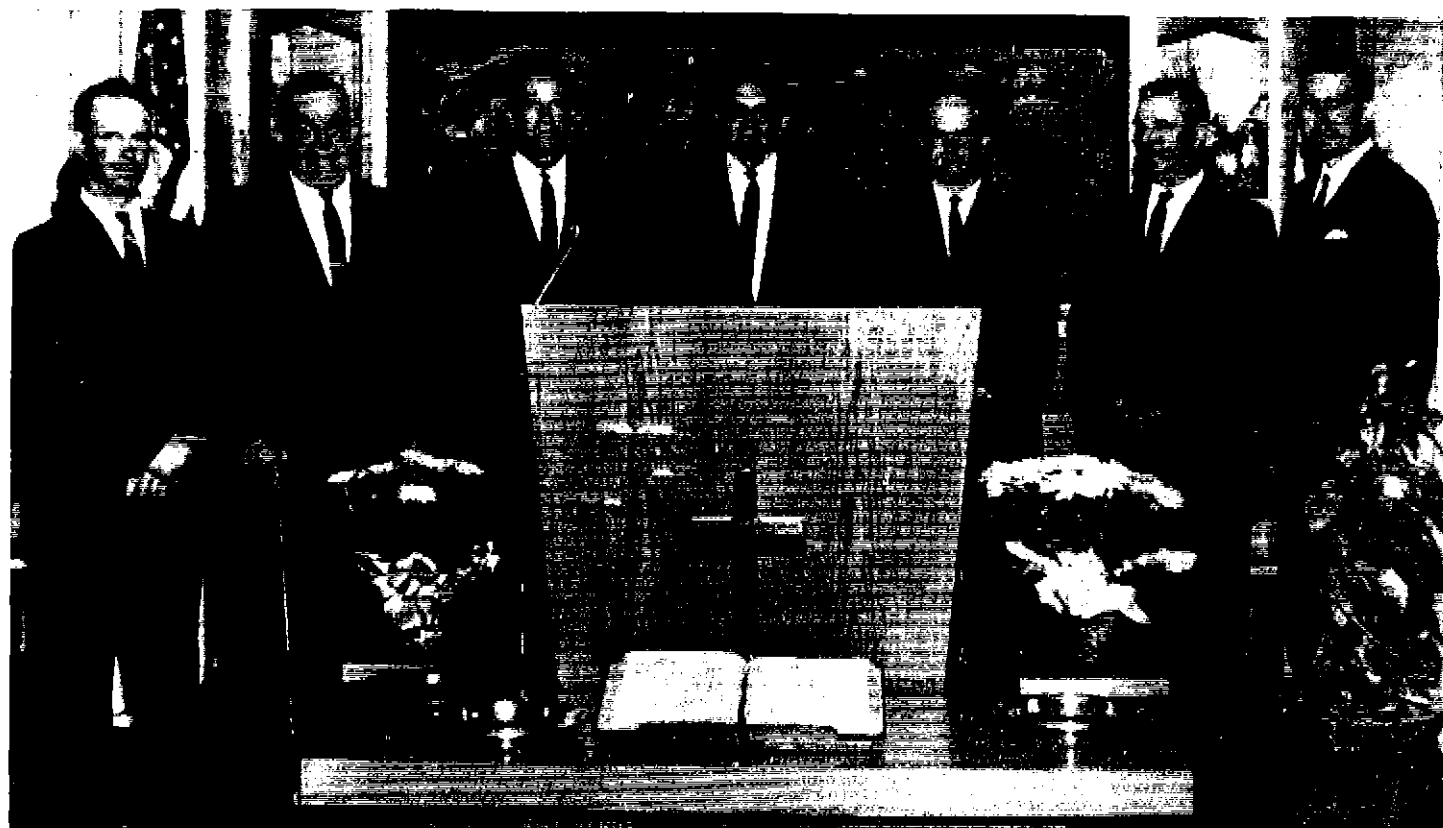

1149 vehicles are safety checked

A total of 1149 vehicles were checked during the two-day Circle of Safety vehicle check conducted here Friday and Saturday, according to check coordinator, John Scott. This figure is virtually identical to the total a year ago, but is was the hope of the sponsoring organizations that this number would be matched on Saturday. However, only about half of this number of vehicles came through the lanes the final day. The committee estimates that there may be as many as 400 to 500 vehicles in the area that did not go through the lanes either day. The check lane in the above picture is one of two that were operated on West First Street during the two days. Officer Bob Cook, along with volunteers from youth organizations were conducting the check when the picture was taken. In the other picture, taken at one of the two check lanes on East First St., Julie Tremaine of the Rainbow Girls attaches a Safety Lane sticker to the windshield of this car, indicating it had passed the check. At left (back to camera) is Safety Check Coordinator, John Scott, who was on duty at one or other of the lanes most of the time during the two days. Cooperating in conducting the Vehicle check were the Sumner FFA, the Sumner Police Department, the American Legion Auxiliary, Rainbow Girls, Driver Education Department of the school and local car dealers and service stations.
