Born in Middlebury Vt. Sept. 27, 1843 a son of Chas and Ellen Baker Garner who emigrated from England in 1840. Came to Rockford Ill. in 1848 He was the eldest of six children. Then the family moved in the same county to a small village named Durand from which place he was living when he first enlisted in Ci. B. 7 Wis. Inf. made up in the state just over the line north. He was however under age and in about 3 months his parents got his discharge when he returned home and when he became of age he again enlisted in Ci. C. 55 Ill. Inf. on Oct. 2, 1861. Was wounded at Shiloh Took part in the battles of Mission Ridge Vicksburg and siege of Atlanta. Was with Sherman on the march to the sea. Served 35 months under Col. Stewart Capt. Chas. Andrews and Lt. Root. Oliver of the 55 Ill. Inf. Returned to Durand Ill. and came to Osage Ia in 1898. In 1871 he moved to Waverly. was married to Hattie Van Tassel Jan 15, 1872 who preceeded him in death. Mr Harner was interested in many enterprises from buying stock in the early days to buting grain and farming extensively in Ia. The D. and ruing a string of elevators in the Canadian northwest. around Weyburn Sas. at Waverly al he was in the lumber and coal business! His interest continued in these enterprises up to the time of his death. He served as mayor of Waverly at one tile and other offices with credit. J.C. Graner was consired a very keen business man. He affiliated with the Masonic fraternity and the G.A.R. of Waverly Ia.
