

IOWA MAKING PLANS FOR \$13,151,523 IN U. S. WORK RELIEF

INFORMATION ON USES AWAITED

Requirements on Labor and Supervision Will Be Announced.

AMES, May 17. (AP)—State officials today awaited detailed information from Washington governing use of the \$13,151,523 which was allotted Iowa in the distribution yesterday of federal work relief money for highway and grade crossing elimination purposes.

Chief Engineer Fred White of the state highway commission said plans for projects to be financed with the money are ready for work to begin as soon as the government requirements on labor and supervision are announced.

Included in the allotment are \$4,891,664 for highways, roads and streets; \$5,600,679 for grade crossing elimination and protection; \$2,500,180 of Hayden-Carwright act while for federal highway aid.

White said the latter allotment is nearly all already allocated to projects under contract.

Will Improve Rivers. WASHINGTON, May 17. (AP)—Permanent improvement for navigation of the Mississippi and Missouri rivers along Iowa's boundaries was a step nearer today following allotment to those streams of a generous share of the \$13,151,523.

ACKLEY, May 17.—George Zacharias, 59, died Thursday at his home in Ackley following a lingering illness due to paralytic strokes. Four years ago he suffered a stroke from which he recovered. He was unable to be able to resume his work. Two years ago he suffered another stroke, from which he never recovered.

Born July 16, 1875, in Hamsweher, Germany, he came to America with his parents in 1889. The family settled near Wellsburg. On Dec. 7, 1903, he was married to Effie Eckhoff and lived on a farm near Ackley for four years. Since that time he made his home in Ackley.

Surviving are the widow, two sons, Henry of Chicago, Theodore of Sparks, Wis., one daughter, Herman of Parker, S. Dak., Albert of Ackley, Joe of Bradford, Ed of Independence, Miss Myra of Des Moines, and Miss Annie and Dora of Bradford and Anna of Independence.

Funeral services will be planned upon the arrival of the body here. Although it is thought they will be held Sunday afternoon at the home by the Rev. Ernest Seybold, pastor of St. John's Evangelical church.
