Not Much Effect From Loan on Price of Corn

The government's 57-cent corn loan has had no measurable effect on the average price of corn since received by Geoffrey Shepherd and Walter W. Wilson, Iowa State college economists, who have recently completed a report on corn prices. They state, however, that the loan may have had a temporary effect early in the season—in November or December.

The economists base their conclusions on an analysis of the important influences which determine corn prices and how they would have operated in 1938-39 if there had been no loan. The answer is surprisingly close to the actual price this year.
The Iowa State economists point out that their analysis indicates nothing about what may happen during the remainder of the corn marketing year. After corn planting, the condition of the new crop will be the most important price influence. Since 238 million bushels of corn in the Corn Belt are tied up as security for government loans, it is possible that some areas might experience a shortage of corn for feeding near the end of the season, Iowa, with 140 million bushels of corn, is a possibility for such a "shortage."

However, the economists do not see the possibility of a squeeze on corn prices for very great since farm stocks of corn April 1, excluding the corn which was sold, were above average.
A strong increase in demand or pressure for a short crop this year are about the only things which would cause a sharp rise in corn prices between now and the next harvest.
